3.0 Establishment of Quorum

A quorum of the members being present, and all the members having been sent notice of the meeting in accordance with the provisions of the *Not-for-profit Corporations Act, 2010* (Ontario), the Chairperson declared the meeting to have been regularly called and properly constituted for the transaction of business.

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The scrutineer reported that there were forty-six (46) voting members present, and there were five (5) members represented by proxy. The Chair adopted the report of the scrutineers and declared accordingly. The Scrutineers' Report on Attendance is included in the minutes.

11.0 Confirmation of Articles of Amendment and By-laws

Rugby Ontario transitioned to the *Not-for-profit Corporations Act, 2010* (Ontario), otherwise referred to as the "Ontario Not-for-profit Corporations Act", and as such the articles of amendment were drafted and approved by the Rugby Ontario Board of Directors and Bylaws No.2 was drafted and approved by the Rugby Ontario Board of Directors April 7, 2024. The Chair requested the Vice Chair present the following two (2) motions to confirm these.

Motion – To confirm by special resolution the articles of amendment approved by the board of directors on April 7, 2024.

Duly Moved (EORU) and Seconded (Burlington Centaurs RFC) Motion unanimously carried.

Motion – To confirm by special resolution:

- (a) the repeal of the current by-laws of The Ontario Rugger Union, as approved by the board of directors on April 7, 2024; and
- (b) the enactment of new General Operating By-law No. 2, as enacted by the board of directors on April 7, 2024.

Duly Moved (EORU) and Seconded (Crusaders RFC) Motion unanimously carried.


12.0 Election of Directors

Dear Members, Partners, and Rugby Community,

It is with great pride and gratitude that I present this CEO Report for the 2025 Rugby Ontario Annual General Meeting. This year has been one of resilience, growth, and renewed momentum for rugby in Ontario. As we reflect on the accomplishments of the past twelve months, we also look ahead with optimism and purpose as we prepare to enter the final year of our current strategic plan.

2024 Highlights & Achievements

1. Growth in Participation

Across the province, we saw encouraging growth in rugby participation, particularly in youth and grassroots programs. Built on the foundations of community support and adaptability, together, we have not only brought players back to the field but have also inspired a new generation to take up the sport. Through initiatives like the Sessional Coaches, Let's Play Rugby and Women in Leadership Fund programs, we are making investments directly into clubs and communities across Ontario through club-led activities and professional development to support continued recruitment and retention in all facets of the game.

2. Club & Community Development

We were proud to support numerous club development initiatives in 2024, including increased opportunities for coach and match official education, the Let's Play Rugby and Sessional Coaches programs, the Women in Leadership Fund and the continuation of various club development webinars and conference sessions. The development team were active in forming numerous committees and working groups made up of representatives from within the broader rugby community to advise and lend their experience in growing the game at all levels. These efforts have reinforced the sustainability and capacity of our member clubs and is building a strong platform for future growth.

3. Competitive Excellence

Ontario's representative teams once again showcased our province's rugby talent at regional and national competitions. The Ontario Blues programming included the continuation of the Senior Women's regional teams' participation in the Quebec Ontario Rugby Championship, while the Senior Men's program returned for a series of matches in partnership with a legacy program of the Arrows Academy. A major highlight of 2024 was the outstanding performance of our Under 19 Men's and Women's teams, both of whom captured gold medals at the 2024 Canadian Rugby Championship









U19, held in Nova Scotia. These victories are a testament to the dedication of our athletes, coaches, and support staff, and reflect the strength of our club system. The Ontario Blues Development Academy began its evolution of becoming a regional program allowing greater opportunity for athletes to train in a performance-development program.

This year also saw the successful development and delivery of the Under 17 and Under 19 Interbranch competitions, a significant step forward in strengthening our player pathway. These competitions provided a higher level of meaningful, regional competition and have helped expand the talent pool by enabling more players to compete at elevated standards within their regions. The initiative has not only increased competitive opportunities but has also enhanced talent identification and development across the province.

4. Events & Engagement

From provincial championships to festivals and community outreach events, Rugby Ontario was active in engaging members and fans. These events not only celebrated rugby but strengthened the bonds across our rugby family. 2024 marked the closing of Fletcher's Fields, the iconic home of rugby in Ontario. Over the decades, this venue has witnessed countless matches, from fierce competitions to heartwarming moments of camaraderie. It has been a gathering place for families of multiple generations, friends, and aspiring athletes, coaches and match officials. We thank all those who played a role in the creation and ongoing leadership of this bespoke rugby ground. Fletcher's Fields has created a long-lasting legacy for the sport, which will continue to benefit the Ontario rugby community for years to come.

Finally, the evolution and restructuring of competitions became the focus of attention in the later months of 2024. Our team worked to engage and consult with club and branch representatives at every level to conceptualize new models and competition structures that will provide meaningful competition in a way that supports the greatest number of clubs, reduces travel barriers, and creates opportunities for clubs to advance through a clearly defined competition pathway. To coincide with these efforts, Rugby Ontario also introduced a new Event Hosting model, providing clubs the opportunity to bid to host marquee competitions, festivals and events in 2025 and beyond.

5. Investment in Marketing, Communications & Digital Strategy

In 2024, Rugby Ontario made a strategic investment in the long-term visibility and engagement of our sport by retaining the services of Cimoroni, a marketing and communications agency with a strong industry reputation. Leveraging the strengths and expertise of an outsourced team, we are confident in the agency's comprehensive approach, experienced team, and proven track record across integrated services. We believe this partnership aligns strongly with our strategic needs and will deliver significant value as we aim to increase awareness, engagement and the overall profile of our sport.

6. New Administrative Office at the Toronto Pan Am Sports Centre

In alignment with our vision to position Rugby Ontario within a high performance and community sport environment, we successfully relocated our administrative office to the Toronto Pan Am Sports Centre in December 2024. This state-of-the-art facility offers a dynamic and collaborative workspace and strengthens our connection to both the broader sport ecosystem and the local community.

REPORT NAME: GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The prime role of the Governance Committee is to provide ongoing oversight, review and recommendations of the Corporation's governance structure and operations. The Committee continued to do so this past year.

While updating the RO Governance Manual, approved by the Board this past Octboer, we took a leading role is reviewing the Terms of Reference for the respective RO Committees. Most committees are up-to-date and operating nicely and need little adjustment. We recommended that each Committee add 'Priorities' to its Terms of Reference. This is still a work in progress. There are also a few newer committees facing the inevitable challenge of starting a new process and will require additional support in the coming months. For example, the proposed Education and Schools Committee (a committee to facilitate relations between, for example, RO and OFSAA, Ministry of Education, Ministry of Colleges and Universities etc.) has not yet commenced (largely due to the author's time away from rugby for a knee replacement). It, and other new ones identified in the most recent RO Strategic Plan, should start up soon.

The Committee had several discussions with the Match Officials community this past year, facilitating a new way for Match Official representation within each branch. We supported the approvals of the new Match Officials Terms of reference, both within RO and the branches.

We again spent quality time working with legal counsel with the hope of making RO's relatively new (Spring 2022) bylaws compliant to the new Ontario Not-for-Profit Corporation Act (ONCA), required October 2024. What we thought might be a simple updating of 8-10 smaller areas, turned out to be a re-formatting of the entire document. These updates were approved at the last AGM. There might still be a few minor adaptations required, but for the most part the corporation is currently ONCA compliant. We can also use the RO bylaws, and a few club-compliant samples, as templates for the clubs and branches which might still be seeking updated bylaws (now past due!).

The Committee also worked closely with the Branch Council in discussing various branch issues and, as ever, the Committee was also asked to review a few specific RO governance issues during the year, all to satisfaction. The next task for the Committee is securing effective development plans of the next RO strategic plan, due in 2026.

This is my last year as Governance chair, having reached the maximum allotted time on the ROB Board, and I want to thank all those who supported our efforts the past six years – past and present Board colleagues, the branches and the broader community and, especially, the RO staff. I like our chances of future success in Rugby Ontario.

Dear Members:

Introduction 2024 was a year of significant progress and transition for Rugby Ontario. With a primary focus on alignment across grassroots initiatives, club development, coach and match official education, competitions and events, and high-performance pathways, our aim was to create a unified framework fostering growth and sustainability across all levels of the game.

Grassroots and Club Development Grassroots rugby and club development remained at the core of our operational focus. Efforts centered on increasing participation and enhancing club capabilities to support sustainable growth. Collaboration between departments ensured alignment with broader development strategies, reinforcing pathways from grassroots to high-performance.

Coach and Match Official Development 2024 marked the introduction of dedicated development specialists for both match officials and coaches. These specialists played a crucial role in identifying and addressing developmental needs, delivering targeted education, and supporting individuals in their roles. Their work has already begun to yield positive results, setting the foundation for long-term success.

Towards the end of the year, we requested expressions of interest in our newly proposed Technical Game Leader Program. This initiative aims to cultivate technical expertise at all levels, ensuring a consistent and high-standard approach to the game's technical aspects.

A significant target for 2024 was to build and publish a comprehensive education calendar for the 2025 season. However, delays associated with the implementation of a new Learning Management System by Rugby Canada introduced unforeseen challenges. Ambiguity surrounding the system's readiness led to delays in delivering a finalized calendar. Despite this, foundational work was completed, and we are well-positioned for an improved and streamlined educational offering in 2025 and beyond.

Competitions and Events This year saw the final events hosted at Fletcher's Field, where turbulent weather conditions posed unique challenges. Despite these adversities, our competitions and events were executed with professionalism and resilience. Recognizing the need for future adaptability, we issued our first expressions of interest for hosting events in 2025, paving the way for a more diverse and geographically inclusive event calendar.









The initial drafts of new competition schedules and structures were released in 2024. These were accompanied by the understanding that iterative refinements would be necessary, informed by feedback and learnings from stakeholders.

High-Performance Pathways Alignment between high-performance pathways and the club competition structure was a significant focus in 2024. By creating synergy between these areas, we ensured that athletes and coaches benefit from a cohesive and supportive environment. Relationships with interbranch and inter-provincial competitions have grown, providing enriched opportunities for development. These partnerships have fostered better environments for athletes to compete and for coaches to refine their skills, creating a robust pipeline for talent progression.

Conclusion 2024 was a year of transition and foundational growth, marked by new initiatives, structural changes, and valuable lessons learned. As we look forward to 2025, we are filled with excitement and optimism for the opportunities ahead. With strengthened alignment and a commitment to continuous improvement, Rugby Ontario is well-equipped to build on the successes of 2024 and achieve even greater milestones in the coming year.

Acknowledgments I extend my gratitude to all staff, volunteers, stakeholders, and participants whose dedication and hard work made this year's achievements possible. I am delighted with the continued work of community based operational committees. Together, we are shaping a brighter future for rugby in Ontario.

The 2024 season continued a full roll out of the Blue Card program, in full adherence of Rowan's Law.

Over the course of the 2024 season, 82 Blue Cards were given out by Match Officials, medical & training staff, and club members. Of the 82, 65 athletes have since returned to play; 44 returned through the Initial Medical Assessment (indicating no suspected concussion), and 21 returned through following Graduated Return to Play Protocols and subsequent Medical Clearance. Currently, 17 athletes remain in the Blue Card protocol without returning to play; 2 are currently in the Return to Play process and 15 have taken no action since receiving their Blue Card.

Moving forward, clubs have nominated a Blue Card Lead who will be added into SportLoMo, and whenever a player from their club receives a Blue Card, they will be notified. Clubs are also now able to input their players into the Blue Card process directly on SportLoMo, should injuries or concerns arise during training, practices or during other sports.

Senior Rugby

Ontario Women's League

In 2024 the Ontario Women's League (OWL) remained at an 8-team league. Teams played each other once, before being divided into two divisions to play an additional two regular season games prior to the OWL Cup Playoffs.

After the regular season the top 6 teams played off in a 6-team bracket to earn their spot to play for the OWL Cup.

OWL Cup Day took place on August 10th at Fletcher's Fields, featuring the OWL 1XV & 2XV Cup Finals and the OWL 1XV 3rd Place Playoff. This event was particularly historic, marking the final OWL games ever played at Fletcher's Fields and providing a memorable send-off for the venue.

Adding to the significance of the day, Asian Hogan Rochester, Canadian National Team member and Paris 2024 Rugby 7s silver medalist, was honored on the field during halftime of the OWL Cup Final—an inspiring moment for all in attendance.

The event was further enhanced by Humber College's video production team, who graciously live-streamed the OWL 1XV Cup Final and the two Canadian Classics matches played in the evening. These games, featuring fresh new broadcast graphics, are now available to watch on the Rugby Ontario YouTube channel.

Despite a few minor technical challenges, OWL Cup Day saw a fantastic turnout, celebrating the competition and spirit of Ontario Women's League rugby in a fitting farewell to Fletcher's Fields. The 2024 OWL Cup broadcast drew 883 live viewers and 1,800 total viewers, marking a 138.6% increase in live viewership and an 80% increase in total viewership compared to 2023 (370 live viewers and 1,000 total viewers).

Marshall League

In 2024 the Marshall League followed the same structure as it did in 2022. 4 regions of 4 clubs, paired together into 2 conferences. Following a 10-game regular season, the teams played off in two playoff games to determine seeding for McCormick and Fall Cups, as well as Intermediate Cup participants.

Men's Cups

The McCormick Cup was played as an 8-team bracket with the top 8 teams from the Marshall competing. The remainder of the Marshall League competed for the 6-team bracket Fall Cup. The Brampton Beavers won the Intermediate Cup. The Gee Gage Cup did not run in 2024.

McCormick Cup Day took place on September 28th at Fletcher's Fields, delivering an action-packed and emotionally charged day of rugby. The event began with the Monilex All Abilities Charity Game, followed by the McCormick Cup Consolation Final, the Fall Cup, and the highly anticipated McCormick Cup Final.

This historic occasion was bittersweet for the rugby community, as it marked the final competitive rugby event ever played at Fletcher's Fields. To honor the venue's legacy, facility staff organized a special farewell luncheon and an outdoor beer garden, creating a commemorative atmosphere. The turnout was extraordinary, with the grandstand filled to capacity, reflecting the deep significance of the day.

Rugby Ontario took the opportunity to elevate the event experience, introducing a pre-game ceremonial segment and a dramatic team run-on, which engaged the crowd and heightened the energy leading into an electrifying McCormick Cup Final that came down to the final seconds. For the event's broadcast, Rugby Ontario partnered with a new production team, Dnode, transforming the viewing experience. The revamped coverage featured motion graphics, sponsor logos, and enhanced visuals—innovations that Rugby Ontario plans to build upon in 2025 and beyond.

The 2024 McCormick Cup broadcast attracted 1,698 live viewers and 3,700 total viewers, representing increases of 124.6% and 27.6%, respectively, compared to 2023 (756 live viewers and 2,900 total viewers).

Junior Rugby

2024 was another great year of junior rugby. U14 Boys and Girls leagues ran from the end of May until mid-August. Across the Province, 29 clubs participated in the U14 Boys leagues, and 25 clubs participated in the U14 Girls leagues. The U14 leagues culminated with U14 Wrap Up Day, which was run at Fletcher's Fields in conjunction with the U12 Minor Festival on August 18th. The U14 girls' competitions played in the morning, with the U14 boys playing in the afternoon, but unfortunately cut short due to severe weather. Thirteen U14 girls' teams and fifteen U14 boys played in round robin competition to end the year.

U16, U18 Girls and Boys leagues ran between June and August. Each age grade had 4 regional leagues playing across the province, with a total of 40 different clubs being involved in at least one age grade's competition.

The U16 & U18 leagues culminated in teams qualifying through their regions for Junior Cup Day. In 2024, Rugby Ontario hosted two Junior Cup Days at Fletcher's Fields:

- U18 Junior Cup Day took place on August 10th alongside the OWL 1XV & 2XV Cup games.
- U16 Junior Cup Day took place on August 17th as a standalone event.

Unfortunately, severe thunderstorms struck Fletcher's Fields on August 17th, causing extended delays and forcing Rugby Ontario to make the difficult decision to cut games in an effort to finish before sunset. While there was hope to proceed with the medal round matches, the weather continued to worsen, leaving the fields unplayable. Prioritizing athletes' safety, Rugby Ontario made the executive decision to postpone the remaining matches until August 20th.

In a true display of sportsmanship, the clubs set to compete for third place agreed to share the bronze medal. On August 20th, both the U16 boys' and girls' finals were played at Fletcher's Fields, with a picture-perfect sunset backdrop marking the conclusion of an incredible season.

Between September and October, 15 club-hosted stops took place across the U14, U16 & U18 age categories. The season culminated with the Junior Club 7s Championship, hosted by Rugby Ontario at the Barrie Community Sport Complex on October 27th (girls) and October 28th









(boys). The event featured a U14 7s round robin competition, along with provincial championships for U16 & U18 clubs, bringing together 22 unique clubs from across the province.

Weather once again posed a challenge – on October 27th, players endured brisk temperatures, rain and bursts of hail. Fortunately, the conditions did not disrupt play, and the event was a resounding success.

2024 Rugby in The Square (RITS)

The 2024 edition of Rugby in the Square brought together 21 corporate teams, rugby enthusiasts, and the broader community for an unforgettable day at Nathan Phillips Square in downtown Toronto. The event once again showcased rugby's unique ability to unite people through sport, competition, and camaraderie in an urban setting.

This year's tournament featured a co-ed, non-contact flag rugby format, with corporate teams competing in a fast-paced 5-aside structure. Each team was guaranteed a minimum of three games, allowing for an exciting mix of friendly competition and professional networking. After a full day of thrilling matchups, EQ Bank emerged as the 2024 Rugby in the Square Champions, demonstrating outstanding teamwork, skill, and sportsmanship throughout the tournament.

In addition to corporate teams, the event once again featured club Mixed Ability flag rugby games, emphasizing the sport's inclusivity by featuring athletes of all abilities playing together. This initiative aligns with Rugby Ontario's mission of Rugby For All, providing a platform to grow awareness and visibility for Mixed Ability sport within the broader community.

Beyond the action on the field, Rugby in the Square 2024 was a true celebration of rugby's vibrant culture, made possible by the incredible support of our sponsors and partners. Attendees enjoyed delicious food from Longo's and Chick-fil-A, refreshments from Amsterdam Brewery, and on-site athletic therapy services provided by SportSide Medical. Puma outfitted participants with high-quality jerseys and apparel, while Metro Supply Chain played an integral role in supporting the event's logistics and operations.









Our official event partner, the Toronto Inner-City Rugby Foundation (TIRF), along with their dedicated team and a tremendous group of volunteers, were instrumental in organizing and delivering the event. Gilbert Rugby Canada also supported the event by providing match balls, ensuring a premium rugby experience.

The 2024 Rugby in the Square was not only a competitive and community-focused event but also a major fundraising success. The event generated over \$100,000 in team registrations, nearly \$3,000 in beer sales, and resulted in over \$40,000 in profits for Rugby Ontario. These funds directly support Rugby Ontario's ongoing efforts to make rugby more accessible for youth across the province, including funding athlete scholarships, covering participant registration fees, and supporting local community rugby programs.

Hall of Fame & Awards Gala

The 2024 Hall of Fame & Awards Gala was a night to remember, bringing together 286 attendees to celebrate the rich history and bright future of rugby in Ontario. The evening was filled with heartfelt speeches, honouring both living legends and those who have passed, creating an emotional and inspiring atmosphere.

Beyond the Hall of Fame inductions, the gala recognized individuals and teams who had an outstanding 2024 season, celebrating their contributions and achievements in the rugby community. It was a moment to reflect on the past while also looking ahead to the future of the sport.

The event saw an impressive turnout from various clubs, with the Irish Canadians RFC making their presence known, arriving 56 strong in their signature green jackets. Fittingly, they were the last to leave, truly "closing the place down" in a celebration worthy of rugby tradition.

Beer sales were strong throughout the evening, with total topping \$5000, further demonstrating the lively and social spirit of the event. From the first toast to the final farewell, the 2024 Hall of Fame & Awards Gala was a fitting tribute to the sport and its dedicated community, setting the stage for another incredible year of rugby in Ontario in 2025.









Mixed Ability Rugby

Mixed Ability Rugby supports Rugby Ontario's strategic mission to lead, support and promote Rugby for All from communities to clubs to province through ensuring that all individuals regardless of their age, ability, background, or previous sport experience can play rugby.

11 clubs ran Mixed Ability programming at their clubs in 2024 ranging from in-house programs and house-leagues to competitive contact and non-contact teams. The flag version of the game continues to be the more prevalent version, however three clubs offered contact Mixed Ability Rugby. This year also featured the first women's contact Mixed Ability club competition in Ontario. With changing staff at the Abilities Centre, we were unable to offer the Mixed Ability Sport Coach Certification in 2024 but look forward to upskilling more coaches in 2025.

8 teams from 5 clubs participated in this year's All-In-Rugby Cup on August 11th at Fletcher's Fields. Teams participated in a flag rugby tournament and had the opportunity to participate in an introduction to T1 Rugby session led by Rugby Ontario and Rugby Canada staff members to learn about this new version of the game ahead of a transition to it for the 2025 season. The day also included an open planning meeting with RO staff and club members coming together to discuss the future of Mixed Ability Rugby in Ontario. A 6th club, while unable to send a team to participate sent a delegation to participate in the meeting and T1 session to support their future growth.

In addition to the tournament championship, teams were also competing for the coveted Spirit of the Game Trophy. The Spirit of the Game Trophy is awarded to the team with the most Spirit of the Game points at the end of the All-In-Rugby Cup. Teams receive up to 3 points for each of the World Rugby values (Integrity, Passion, Solidarity, Discipline, and Respect) awarded by the match official following each game. Congratulations to the 2024 All-In-Rugby Cup Champions, the Oshawa Vikings Lokis and the 2024 Spirit of the Game Champions, Muddy York Blue!

Mixed Ability Rugby was also on display at the Canada vs Scotland men's international match in Ottawa on July 6th when Muddy York and the Canadian Jax joined forces for a half-time game. Club leaders LeeAnn Napiorkowski from the Canadian Jax, and John Watkins from the Oshawa Vikings also joined Rugby Ontario's Rugby Development Manager, Jocelyn Poirier, to share about their programs on a Rugby Canada professional development webinar on Inclusive Rugby.

Thank you to all Mixed Ability clubs for continuing to bring to life the Rugby Ontario vision of Rugby For All!

Minor Rugby

The 2024 Minor Rugby season saw an increase in overall registration numbers making it our biggest year post-COVID. The main area of growth was non-contact registrations, which increased on both the girls' and boys' sides this year. The number of clubs offering minor programming remained stable at 44 clubs with registered minor rugby players spanning from as young as two years old up to twelve years old. Below is a breakdown of minor registrations over the last four seasons.

2024 saw a new record number of Minor Festivals scheduled, with 38 planned by clubs across the province. In addition to these club-hosted events, Rugby Ontario held its annual end-of-season Minor Festival split for the first time over two weekends at Fletcher's Fields: U6-U10 on August 11th and U12 on August 18th alongside the U14 Wrap Up Day.

Event activations and on-site vendors, including lawn games, a face painting station, professional photographer, GTA Softees Ice Cream Truck and Croc Drip Charms were hits as always, further contributing to the vibrant festival atmosphere.

For the second consecutive year, Rugby Ontario supported a West Minor Festival hosted by Fergus Highland RFC on August 10th, 2024, and, new this year, introduced an East Minor Festival hosted by the Lanark Highlanders on July 21st, 2024.

These festivals continue to play a vital role in fostering a love for rugby among young athletes, providing a fun and inclusive environment for players of all skill levels.

In 2023, clubs faced challenges with poor and shifting air quality, which affected festivals. In 2024, extreme weather presented new obstacles for both clubs and Rugby Ontario staff.

On August 18th, during the U12 Minor Festival and U14 Wrap-Up Day, Fletcher's Fields was struck by severe winds and torrential downpours. The sudden storm sent debris flying, destroyed assets, and forced the event to end early for the safety of all attendees. In a remarkable display of community spirit, everyone rallied together to recover lost items, clean up debris and support one another during the frightening ordeal.

Fortunately, no injuries were reported. The challenges we encountered on this day have served as a learning experience for Rugby Ontario, better informing the requirements of events and additional precautions and contingency planning needed.

We continue to see incredible passion and dedication from all involved in Minor Rugby and want to thank all those who continue to volunteer their time to drive growth in the game.

Development Initiatives

Sessional Coaches

Building on the success of last year's pilot project with Rugby Canada, four Ontario clubs (Ottawa Ospreys, Aurora Barbarians, Toronto Nomads, and Windsor Rogues) were selected to receive funding to hire a part-time Sport for All Sessional Coach for spring 2024. The Sessional Coach program follows the Try-Play-Stay model of World Rugby's Get Into Rugby which involves Rookie Rugby delivery in local elementary schools where students get to try rugby for the first time, followed by an opportunity for multiple classes or schools to come together in a festival format to play rugby, and then a club-run Try Rugby day for new participants to be connected to a club where they can stay in the sport.









Let's Play Rugby Projects

New in 2024, Rugby Ontario secured funding from Rugby Canada for seven clubs to run Let's Play Rugby projects targeting the recruitment of 20 new girls ages 13-16 in non-contact club rugby programs. Six clubs completed their projects: Brockville Privateers, Burlington Centaurs, Caledon Cavaliers, Fergus Highland, Georgian Bay Titans, and the Middlesex-Huron Millers. The clubs were provided with funding and resources to support their plans including a 10-week non-contact program plan. While there were varying approaches and levels of success amongst them, almost all indicated they would be very likely to repeat the project and cited successes including new club registrants, new positive connections with schools, increased awareness of the sport within the community, expanded club programming, new coaches trained and mentored, and an elementary school flag rugby tournament featuring over 560 participants!

Canada Summer Jobs

For 2024 Rugby Ontario made the difficult decision to cancel the Community Rugby Intern Initiative through the Canada Summer Jobs program. Rather than applying for funding on behalf of clubs and adding a level of paperwork between the club and the government, we shared information about the program and tips for applying to support clubs in securing their own direct funding with the goal of increasing flexibility for clubs as well as supporting a shift to increased independence. While many clubs were unable or unprepared to apply on their own for 2024, several were successful in securing funding for one or more paid interns through the Canada Summer Jobs program. Congratulations to all clubs who received funding!

Women in Leadership Fund

New in 2024 Rugby Ontario introduced an expansion of the Rugby Canada Women in Leadership Fund to support more women leaders from Ontario. In addition to the two women from Ontario funded by Rugby Canada (Leanne Stillman – Toronto Nomads, and Tracy Roberts – Middlesex-Huron Millers), Rugby Ontario directly funded two women to receive up to \$1500 towards their professional development as a community rugby leader. The 2024 RO Women in Leadership Fund recipients were the following:

- Kelly Zacny President, Georgian Bay Titans
- LeeAnn Napiorkowski President, Canadian Jax and VP Development, Lanark Highlanders

Collectively they used their funding to attend the Sport for Life conference, Be a Game Changer conference, and Petro-Canada Sport Leadership Conference. In addition to their funded development opportunities the two women were part of the larger group of recipients with Rugby Canada, who met regularly throughout the year to connect as a community of practice.









Here's what the women had to say about their experiences:

"I owe much of my success this year to the WIL funding. Coming in blind to a new position was a challenge but the support I received from the WIL group, gave me an amazing group of women to bounce ideas off of, learn from and connect with. What I learned from our sessions helped me to organize myself for the year and gave me others to relate to and realize that I wasn't the only one struggling in certain areas. I feel like I have grown so much in just one season, and I feel more confident because of the experiences I have had with the WIL funding." - Kelly Zacny

"Thank you to Rugby Ontario for including me in the Women In Leadership Program this year. The funding provided allowed me to pursue some PD that would not normally be accessible to me due to financial constraints. I complete a lot of PD in regards to teaching and coaching, but it was great to have the opportunity to finally complete some PD that relates to other aspects of my volunteer work - administration, organization, culture, the admin side of inclusion and the overall experience of sport (not just coaching)... I have now taken on a leadership role with Rugby Ontario as a Regional Coach Developer. The lessons that I have learned through the WIL course and the conferences I have attended have helped me to add new tools to my tool belt that will ultimately help other coaches and administrators in the province. I am grateful for the opportunity to continue my rugby learning journey and I look forward to paying forward the experiences with coaches, administrators and players alike." - LeeAnn Napiorkowski

This program has been continued into 2025 with funding increased to \$2000 each to match the Rugby Canada program. We look forward to seeing the impact these women will continue to have in their communities.

New Committees

2024 saw the introduction of three new groups to support community rugby development in the province. Stemming from the interest in our Youth Engage Program from 2023 and a desire to increase the voice of youth in our community, we introduced a Youth Development Committee consisting of youth between the ages of 15-30 along with a Rugby Ontario staff representative to support the recruitment, retention, and role transition of youth. Upon completion of the Build Belonging Project at the end of 2023 we launched a Build Belonging Legacy Committee to continue the work of this project in supporting belonging and wellbeing along all rugby community members. Finally, a Minor Rugby Working Group was established to review feedback and support the development of minor rugby in the province.

Rugby Ontario would like to thank all the stakeholders who volunteered their time and expertise to these groups. Your dedication to advancing our sport is commendable.









Club Development

2024 saw a continuation of our newly launched Club Development Series as one way we are delivering on our strategic pillar of Support the Club Community.

There were 84 registrants for the series with 39 different Ontario member clubs represented. These sessions are all available to the public now to revisit on our YouTube channel.

We followed up the Winter Series with a development presentation and discussion following the 2024 Rugby Ontario AGM at which Jocelyn Poirier, Manager of Rugby Development, and John Hyland, Director of Rugby Operations, presented updates and led breakout discussions on increasing engagement, identifying barriers and opportunities, and ideas for the fall Club Development Conference.

Following the season, we closed out the year with our second annual Club Development Conference on December 7th at Guelph Collegiate and Vocational Institute. Expanding upon last year's conference, this year featured several keynote speakers in addition to breakout sessions on a variety of topics including coach and match official development led by our own Development Specialists.

Following the conference there was a social where participants were able to continue their conversations and networking. 43 attended the conference in person, doubling attendance from the inaugural event in 2023. An additional 36 were registered as virtual attendees and 29 clubs were represented by these participants. A big thank you goes out to Gary Robinson and his team of volunteers from Guelph CVI who provided the space, tech support, and catering; and to all the speakers and participants who contributed their time, energy, and ideas. We look forward to continuing to grow this event in the years to come.

Member Retention Survey

New in 2024 Rugby Ontario launched a Member Retention Survey at the end of the summer season. The survey was emailed to all registered participants in every category and club across the province with a prize draw incentive offered to increase participation. We received 1228 responses for a response rate of approximately 10% with representation from 95% of member clubs. Responses were anonymous with participants answering both quantitative and qualitative questions about their experience in the sport of rugby and at their club specifically.











Years you/your family have been involved with your current club?

Full responses were separated by club and shared with the respective club presidents. The full data set was also shared with a research team at York University to conduct analysis that will help inform future development initiatives. The same research team, led by Dr. Karl Erickson, are working on analyzing Rugby Ontario participation data from the past six years. Together these two sets of data will help to paint a clearer picture of trends in rugby participation across the province.

Thank you to all those who took the time to complete the survey, to the Youth Development Committee who spearheaded the initial iteration of this survey to provide youth a platform to share their experiences and inform future youth retention initiatives, and to Dr. Erickson and his team at York University for sharing your expertise and passion with us.









RDC Network Introduced

In the fall of 2024 Rugby Ontario received an update and increase on funding from Rugby Canada allowing us to create a new model for Club Development support. This launched the new Rugby Development Consultant Network. The RDC Network is supported by funding from Rugby Canada, Rugby Ontario, and the participating clubs, and consists of six contracted Rugby Development Consultants who will work with our full-time Rugby Development Officer and other development staff to support 34 member clubs. RDCs will support clubs in areas such as strategic planning, volunteer management, project coordination, communication, and resource development. The nature of the Network will allow for increased collaboration within and between clubs, communities, and regions to increase efficiency and expedite the development of all involved. The introduction of the RDC Network marks a significant advancement under our strategic pillar of Support the Club Community and will help us build towards more financially sustainable clubs, stronger community partnerships, and improved club standards including strategic development plans and pathways. Thank you to all participating clubs for your trust and support in the first stages of this initiative.

Events and Competitions Restructuring

In mid-2024, Rugby Ontario began the process of evolving and restructuring its events, leagues, and competitions across all levels to support the growth of the game and enhance the overall sport experience for all involved.

For decades, Fletcher's Fields served as the iconic home of many Rugby Ontario events. However, it's unfortunate closure after 59 years presented an opportunity to rethink the event model. Rugby Ontario embraced this change by expanding large-scale rugby events across the province, allowing clubs to showcase their facilities, generate revenue, and provide a unique experience for participants, spectators, and the rugby community.

In December 2024, Rugby Ontario formally launched the "Bid to Host" process. All member clubs received detailed documents outlining event requirements and the bidding timeline. Rugby Ontario is eager to bring this vision to life. By hosting festivals and competitions in collaboration with clubs across the province, this new model is expected to increase engagement, enhance attendance, and strengthen the rugby community across Ontario.

In addition to the new bid to host process, changes were announced at the close of 2024 with details on the restructuring of all age categories. In 2025, both Marshall and OWL leagues will be restructured to both a premiership and championship division. The Marshall Premiership will include 8 teams, with the Marshall Championship to include 9 for 2025. The OWL Premiership will include 6 teams with the OWL Championship including 8 teams from across the province.

Junior leagues will see a split into the Junior Provincial Cup, and the Junior Regional Cup. U14 and U12 age groups will be grouped as a new Youth category and will see law variation adjustments as well as a new hybrid festival league model. Minors will be introduced to geographic groupings and different types of festivals to support the varying needs of clubs across the province.









Thank you to all stakeholders who provided feedback and revisions throughout the restructuring process. We appreciate the support of the community as we continue to implement and refine these significant developments over the coming years.









REPORT NAME: COMPETITIONS COMMITTEE

In the spring of 2024 following a meeting with club presidents and Rugby Ontario officers, the need for a competitions committee was discussed. Over the next month names of potential candidates were submitted to Rugby Ontario and a final committee was assembled with representatives from central, east, west, and Niagara region, including both men's and women's representatives, branch unions, and referees. The purpose of this committee is to discuss, provide feedback, and advise Rugby Ontario on the structure and competition levels of the rugby leagues in Ontario from U16 to senior men's and women's rugby.

Several issues were identified with the current structures at all levels with the most significant being:

• Disparity in skill level, leading to uncompetitive games and high score differentials.

In the fall of 2024 the competitions committee began to work on possible league structures that would provide multiple levels of competition at each age bracket. After several meetings we have come up with an initial proposal which we are looking forward to sharing with clubs in early 2025 for feedback and adjustments.









REPORT NAME: GRASSROOTS AND CLUB DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The Grassroots and Club Development (GCD) Committee continued its advisory work through:

- Discussions on initiatives to deal with key issues of concern in community rugby;
- Providing review and recommendations on revisions to Rugby Ontario (RO) policies; and
- Advice on topics for the Rugby Ontario Club Development Conference (7-Dec-2024) and Club Development Series (Winter 2025), with the aim of supporting the growth and retention at the community club level, with sessions that bring together expert insights and shared best practices.
- The January 23, 2025, meeting was a restart to the committee:
 - Discussion on identifying key issues for the year and the need to gather insights from clubs.
 - Opportunity for the committee to contribute to the evolution of the fall/winter club development conference in November/December.
- February 27, 2025, meeting:
 - The committee will gather ideas for fall/winter club development conference topics and format
 - Chair will discuss Rugby Ontario's red card policy with Alan Hudson and Brian Crothers. A report will be given by the Chair at the April meeting.
 - Review of the Rugby Canada National Growth Plan. This plan is aiming to strengthen school relationships from elementary to post-secondary and expand non-contact rugby options for juniors and seniors.

The Committee's Terms of Reference (ToR) were finalized and received approval at the Rugby Ontario Board meeting in September 2024. On the recommendations of the Governance Committee, a further review and revisions of all ToR are to be undertaken during the 2025 season.

In December 2024, for personal reasons, Barb Gillie stepped down as Committee Chair, and Sean Rennie, Rugby Ontario Board Director, was appointed as the new Chair. Barb continued to be a member of the Committee as a Board Director representative.

There were also two changes in members of the Committee: Darren Ince replaced Andrew Davies as Toronto Rugby Union representative and John Weller replaced Rob McQueen as South West Rugby Union representative.









We would like to extend our gratitude and thanks to all Committee members for all their hard work, advice, and commitment to growing and developing rugby in Ontario.

REPORT NAME: HIGH PERFORMANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

Dear Members,

The purpose of the High Performance Committee is to make recommendations and provide oversight to the operational functions in RO's HP programs.

Included in this report are specifics provided by Sandro Fiorino, who coordinates all HP programming for Rugby Ontario. He has done a superb job in executing RO's high performance vision.

Perhaps the most significant of many accomplishments by our High Performance athletes for 2024 was the success of our female and male U19 provincial teams. Coming home with two national championship gold medals needs further examination, given the outstanding success these teams achieved. This success was based on a process started three years ago when RO took the initiative in restarting age grade inter-branch competitions at U16 and U18 age levels. This created opportunities for literally hundreds of players to be exposed to age grade representative rugby across the province in an affordable and inclusive framework. Out of these competitions, provincial coaches have been able to draw on a deep pool of potential players. This depth, always a potentially massive advantage for Ontario's representative teams, will continue to be a key foundational building block in producing top level talent, especially as these prayers continue their development with their clubs and university teams.

Ontario continues to produce outstanding female players at the senior level. The East/West/Quebec 7 match series provided excellent competition for our players and additionally provided Rugby Canada Coaches with golden opportunities to see players perform in a highly competitive environment. Equally important from a development perspective, this competition occurred outside of the club competition window, so clubs had their best players available during the season.









Overall Impact from RO HP Programs by the numbers: Ontario players earned opportunities to play for Canada in 2024 as follows:

- U20 Women- 12 players
- U20 Men- 11 Players
- Canada Senior Women- 18 Players
- Canada Senior Men- 13 Players
- Senior Women 7s- 10 Players
- Senior Men 7s- 8 players

Plans are in place to introduce senior men's inter-branch rugby in the fall of 2025, adding another layer of player development to complement university programs across the country. Depth in our player numbers breeds success at the highest levels - in essence that is our long-term goal. We are making progress!

REPORT NAME: HIGH PERFORMANCE REPORT

Rugby Ontario continues to build momentum from year to year with the provincial and high-performance programs in 2024 on both the boys' and girls' sides, increasing participation numbers. The Rugby Ontario High-Performance Program made concerted efforts to keep our provincial athletes and coaching staff engaged through several initiatives:

Rugby Ontario Provincial Academies

In 2024, the High-Performance Program secured provincial funding through OHPSI (Ontario High-Performance Sports Initiative) to subsidize and support male and female academy programs. This marked the eighth year of financing the girl's program (Ontario Blues Development Academy, formerly Rugby Canada Development Academy). The Boy's program pushed forward for the 4th year and was subsidized with Quest for Gold provincial funding.

Summary:

- From October to April, players engaged in regional and centralized technical/tactical training sessions with regional S/C support.
- Regional combines were held as part of the selection process for the academy. Baseline metrics were also collected and tested regularly throughout the program.
- Regional hubs were in Guelph, Toronto and Kingston/Ottawa to service identified athletes across the province. Three hundred forty-six athletes (Ages 14 18) were engaged across both programs.
- Athletic therapy, nutrition and mental performance staff were integrated into the program to support holistic athlete development.

Rugby Ontario Junior Provincial Sevens Programs

Rugby Ontario worked with Branch programs to re-establish and support branch sevens in the U18 age category at the Ontario Summer Games 2024. Over two days, sixteen teams, 200 plus athletes, and over 20 coaches and staff represented NRU, TRU, SWRU, and EORU. NRU Boys finished first, with the TRU taking Silver and SWRU coming home with a Bronze. TRU Girls won Gold, EORU came second, and NRU took a bronze.

Key takeaways: Low cost, minimal travel, more players in the pathway. Similar to the Age-grade Provincial programming, more time together, more time to prepare and more resources for review and learning.









Rugby Ontario Provincial Fifteens Programs

Regional Programming aims to allow players to train and develop with provincial coaches throughout the summer within their regions.

Summary:

Girls age grade:

U17 Girls Program competed in a four-region interbranch playdown in August with over 120 athletes and 12 coaches. Results- NRU 1ST, EORU 2nd, SWRU 3rd

Boys age grade:

U17 Boys Program competed in a four-region interbranch playdown in August with over 120 athletes and 12 coaches. Results- TRU 1ST, NRU 2nd, EORU 3rd

Ontario U19 Men's and Women's Program

Preparation: Athletes competed in the U19 Interbranch competition with 120 plus athletes competing in 3 game series as a selection/confirmation of the player pool that would go on to make up the provincial teams that would compete at the 2024 CRC's.

Programs: The U19 Provincial Team competed at the Nova Scotia 2024 U19 Canadian Rugby Championship. The Men and Women went undefeated and won two gold medals.

The goal for Regional Programming:

The Ontario U19 program provides a two-year high-performance environment (U18s and U19s) that supports the Canada U20 program.

Summary:

Senior Women's Blues

In 2024, Rugby Ontario competed in year 2 of an inter-provincial league between Ontario and Quebec in a seven-game series to aid in identifying talent for the National Senior Women's XV Team (NSWT). The purpose of this is to provide an opportunity for Ontario's senior athletes to be identified by the NSWT coaching staff and have the possibility of being selected for the Pacific 4 Tournament this summer and future NSWT programs. The Senior Women's program was divided into East and West regions, minimizing travel barriers as much as possible. This competition structure allowed the senior women to fully participate in summer club programming while still being able to compete with and against the best in the province and enhance their development. Ontario East finished 2nd, and Ontario West lost a close bronze medal match.

Senior Men's Blues

Partnered with the Toronto Arrows Academy, the Ontario Senior Men's Blues returned to rugby in 2024. More than 50 athletes competed in matches against Quebec, Atlantic, and MLR academies with mixed results. Twenty-five players from this group competed in the Coast-to-Coast Cup in Halifax and finished 2nd.

REPORT NAME: RUGBY ONTARIO MATCH OFFICIALS COMMITTEE

Introduction

2024 was a good year for the Rugby Ontario Match Officials (ROMO). And while any year where we get to run around a field being an integral part of this great game can normally be defined as good; a number of advancements were implemented and successes celebrated that made the last 12 months stand out.

The ROMO Committee

This was my first year as Chair of ROMO and inevitably I was dependent on the expertise and experience of the other members of the Committee. I would like to thank them for the huge amount of work they put in behind the scenes to make sure that we can send well-trained and highly motivated referees to games all over this province. Referee education, development, coaching, appointments, disciplinary – it doesn't happen on its own and we are lucky in Ontario to have a great group of people who are dedicated to ensuring the game is well served by our match officials. The Committee was strongly supported by the leadership and staff of Rugby Ontario, in particular by Myles Spencer and John Hyland.









Respect

It is a well-known phenomenon. You are at a hockey rink or soccer field somewhere in the province of Ontario, you start chatting with another spectator on the sidelines or in the stand, and it emerges that your "main" sport is really rugby. Your new friend then launches into a glowing report of how rugby values its match officials and does not tolerate abuse of any kind with the conclusion being that other sports could learn a thing or two from the egg chasers. Cue feelings of pride for the spirit of rugby.

And, by and large, it is true. Rugby clubs around the world do provide a friendly, welcoming experience for referees as well as visiting players and supporters. However, this culture is not built and maintained by accident – we always have to work at it and nurture it. Every effort must be taken to prevent abuse and, when there are incidents, they must be dealt with swiftly, transparently and with all due process. Match officials, players, clubs, coaches and administrators – we all have a role to play.

It is very encouraging, therefore, the way we are doing that here in Ontario. 2024 was an important year for the promotion and protection of the value of respect in this province. Rugby Ontario is taking this matter seriously, having put in place a number of initiatives suggested and promoted by the ROMO Committee. These initiatives, successfully trialed and implemented on a voluntary basis in 2024, are now broadly in place for the 2025 and beyond. In particular, the clubs are to be commended for embracing the concept of the match official liaison officer, which is compulsory from this season, for clubs playing in leagues above a certain level. Harsher penalties are in place for individuals and clubs that are found to have committed offences of abuse and there are also strict regulations around the proper demarcation of the playing area that will help prevent inappropriate situations from arising while also keeping people safe from accidental contact during the game.

Before the 2024 season kicked off, ROMOC ran a referee workshop development session that included a focus on the theme of abuse. Ahead of the 2025 season we will host a session dedicated entirely to this topic, with a strong emphasis on what referees can do to prevent it happening in the first place, and generally lowering the temperature of flashpoint incidents where it becomes more likely to occur. Match officials are reminded of their responsibilities too. They are told not to accept abuse or dissent, on or off the field. They are also reminded that respect is a two-way street and that as match officials must have our own house in order.

Appointments

Ontario referees punch above their weight outside the province. In 2024, we had two match officials in Major League Rugby – Talal Moe Chaudhry and Pete Pender – despite Toronto no longer having a team in the competition. Moe also refereed on the World Sevens Series and at the 2024 Olympic Games in Paris. Stephen Stothers-Robertson was selected as an assistant referee for the HSBC 7s in Vancouver. Karen Lozada was appointed to several World Rugby and Rugby Americas North matches as a citing commissioner and is also a key member of the World Rugby calibration group for foul play. Pete Pender was chosen to referee the final of the 2024 Canadian University Men's Rugby Championship between ETS and Queen's in Ottawa in November, a game for which another Ontario man, James Neale, was AR.









While it is great to see our officials make contributions beyond our border, our bread and butter is right here in Ontario and that is the primary focus of the ROMO Committee. In 2024, we had 252 registered match officials in the province. This was slightly down on 2023 (276), but it represents a clear improvement on pre-COVID numbers when we had 209 in 2018 and 207 in 2019. Our biggest growth is among female referees – we had more than twice as many women registered to referee in 2024 as compared with 2018. Our active referees remain our focus as they travel the length and breadth of Ontario week in, week out during the season. In 2024, from Ottawa in the east to Sarnia in the south-west and everywhere in between, they fulfilled more than 2,000 fixtures for men's, women's, youths, 15s, sevens, clubs, universities, colleges, everything. It is a monumental collective effort, and we are very proud of their commitment.

At present, the Committee is concerned that too many of those 252 match officials are not involved in enough games through the season. Some referee only a handful of matches (or fewer), and we are working on ways in which we can encourage greater activity among our members for the season ahead.

2024 Awards and Hall of Fame

Each year, Rugby Ontario celebrates its referees by including two awards for match officials at the annual Rugby Ontario Awards, which was held in 2024 in Mississauga. The 2024 winners were:

- Young Match Official of the Year Luca lacovelli
- Senior Match Official of the Year Moe Chaudhry

Moe was also presented with a framed Olympic rugby referees jersey in recognition of his achievement of representing Ontario and Canada on the very highest sporting stage.

Former Ontario referee Rose LaBrèche was also recognized for the significant impact she has had on our game here in Ontario and beyond, by being inducted into the Rugby Ontario Hall of Fame as part of the class of 2024.

Education and Development

At the conclusion of 2024, there were 12 World Rugby educators in Ontario. Four in the East, six in the Central and two in the West. These educators deliver Level 1 and Level 2 match official courses throughout the province, in collaboration with clubs who provide the facilities, and in line with international best practice as defined by the global governing body for the sport.

2024 was a very active year in terms of education. During the season, ROMO held 10 Level 1 courses, in theory producing 107 new referees as a result, although not all those who participate in the courses become active match officials. Follow-up is the key. Post-course activities and ensuring the new match officials are given opportunities to develop have been a focus, using U12 and U14 tournaments as well as assistant referee and shadow refereeing opportunities in other games and tournaments. In coordination with the coaching and appointment leads, educators are following up with their new charges to keep track of their on-field activity and improvement.









The expectation is that for 2025 we will continue to see a rise in the overall numbers of registered match officials in the province.

It is crucial that active referees are constantly being challenged to improve and to go as far as their ambition and ability can take them. In 2024, we held two Level 2 courses, one in the Eastern Region and one in the Toronto Region, with a total of 14 match officials completing the course.

Coaching

While you cannot have a match without a referee, you won't have much of a ref without the coach of match officials (CMO). Just like players, officials do not become expert overnight. Consistent and regular coaching and development are as important in this part of the game as with playing. Prior to the 2024 season, ROMO identified this area as one that needed attention as there were a very small number of CMOs who were available and willing to do the job on a regular basis. Following a CMO course held at the start of the season, 13 new CMOs were added to the roster (six in Toronto, four in Niagara and three in Eastern). This new crop of CMOs fulfilled a total of 73 assignments during the season, involving 44 different match officials. In total, the province has 20 active CMOs, who were assigned to a total of 209 games and 18 tournaments/festivals during the season, with 114 referees seen at least once. CMO reports, especially when accompanied by video review, are our best single tool for match official development and retention. These numbers reflect a huge improvement as against previous years but further growth in this area is still a priority for ROMO.

Conclusion

ROMO is an active group of people, passionate about the game of rugby and determined to serve it as best we can. While we are justifiably proud of our accomplishments, we do not have a culture of resting on our laurels. We are driven to do better, and to contribute more to the game. We believe and subscribe to the rugby values mentioned earlier, and strive to continuously improve, both on and off the pitch. To that end, I am leading a project to draft and implement a multi-year Strategic Plan for ROMO that will complement Rugby Ontario's broader strategies and will identify priorities, specific objectives and key performance indicators that will capitalize on our strengths and deliver on our vision of supporting the development of rugby in Ontario. The intention is that this plan will be finalized in 2025 and implemented from the start of 2026. We look to the future with confidence.









REPORT NAME: MATCH OFFICIAL REPORT

Courses were delivered at clubs across all four of our branches. Thank you to all the clubs who offered their facilities and supported the promotion of our match official opportunities.

Number of Courses Delivered, and New Coaches Trained:

The transition rate from course to registration was a key element studied. Comparing to the 86 participants in Level 1 courses in 2022 of which 51% registered as a match official in 2022, only 19% of those course participants registered as an official in 2023. In 2023, we saw 42% of Level 1 participants register as a match official. This transition rate resulted in the contracting of a Match Official Development Specialist in December 2023 to improve classroom to field transition and raise standard of match officials across the province. The 2024 numbers will be processed based on registration in May 2025 for Match Officials.

John Hyland has made many strides to understand and accommodate the needs of clubs, and the branches and has become an effective partner in our efforts.

Having come to the other side of COVID a bit battered, we are stronger in some senses. We know what we can endure as clubs, and have a better understanding of the need to shore up our club and branch finances. There is increasing evidence of a shift in how municipalities are treating sports groups, and the movement toward user fees has made long standing property ownership, leases, or property management less viable for many clubs and shifted us toward the need for more partnerships, outreach, and growth to make our budgets and, in the longer term, rugby viable. This may become the most important part of growing the game going forward. I urge us all to work together to be recognized as positive community members and contributors to help those around us understand what we contribute.

Despite these challenges, we have grown the game and have more clubs and teams participating. I look forward with a measured sense of relief and an understanding of the efforts that we must put in to find continual growth and success.


